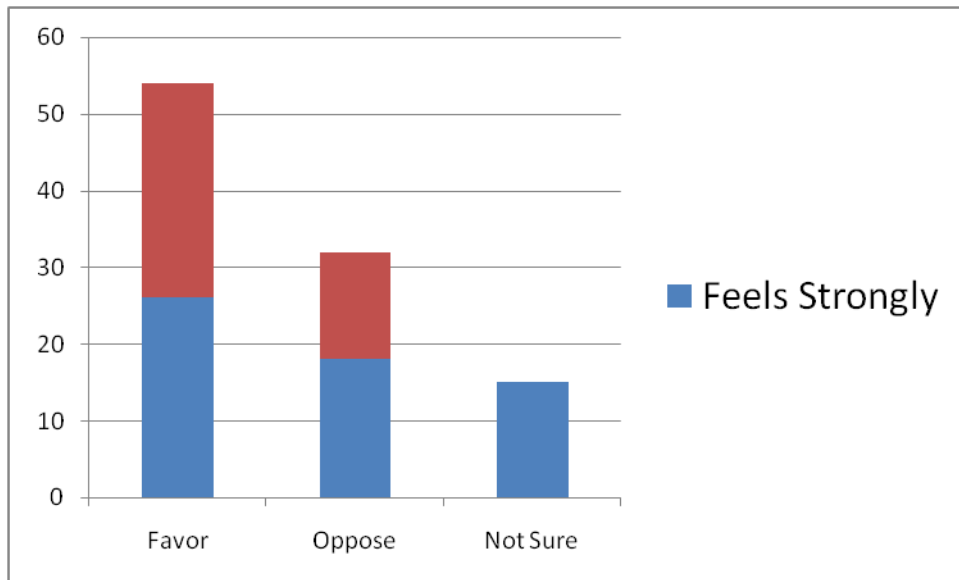
Voters Have Changed their Minds on Measure 57

Findings from a Survey of Registered Oregon Voters conducted by Grove Insight

March 10, 2009

This analysis is based on 500 interviews among registered Oregon voters. The survey was conducted March 4-8, 2009. The margin of error is plus or minus 4.4 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher. Throughout this report, we refer to "younger" and "older" voters. Younger voters are those age 49 and under and older voters are those age 50 and older.

Given the severity of the projected state budget deficit, some have proposed delaying or modifying the implementation of the most costly parts of Measure 57 and, instead, would like to use the money to reduce the size of the proposed cuts to community based addiction treatment, mental health services, and other critical human services. Having heard this, **do you favor or oppose the proposal to delay or modify implementation of Measure 57, or aren't you sure?**

Let's say you agreed with a legislative candidate running in your district on most issues. **Would you be more likely or less likely to support that candidate if they favored delaying the implementation of the most costly parts of Measure 57, which passed overwhelmingly in November 2008,** or doesn't it make a difference to you either way – or aren't you sure?

Much More Likely	14%
Somewhat more Likely	22%
No Difference	44%
Somewhat less likely	6%
Much Less Likely	8%
Not Sure	6%
