

Amendments to HB 2290A

1. (-A6) Allows the Chief Justice of the Oregon Supreme Court to make rules concerning how courts will supervise a person on probation in more than one court.

Streamlines the process, but probably does not save money

2. (-A7) Allows a judge to impose no more than 60 days of incarceration in jail upon a defendant who has violated his or her probation. Applies to the local control population, not those on post-prison supervision.

Savings - \$9 million

3. (-A8) Allows reduction in a person's probation for good behavior, but not to exceed 50% of the person's probation time.

Savings - \$7 million

4. (-A9) **Reduces the term of active post prison supervision and probation. Allows for an extension of post prison supervision and a return to active supervision status.**

Savings - \$1 million

5. (-A10) Streamlines the commutation process for illegal immigrants serving time for a nonviolent felony and who agree to waive the right to appeal deportation.

Savings - \$3 million

6. (-A13) Reduce the penalty for possession of a controlled substance from a B or C felony to an A misdemeanor for person's convicted the first time of possession of a controlled substance. Reduce the penalty for possession of a controlled substance from a C felony to an A misdemeanor for person's convicted possession of .05 grams or less a controlled substance.

Savings - -\$7 million

HB 2335A amendments

(-A22) Phased in implementation of Measure 57 sunsets is for January 1, 2012. Does not impact those already sentenced. Measure 57 still applies to those commit fraud on the elderly or those who sell significant quantities of a controlled substance. **Net savings approximately \$60 million**

Increases earned time from 20% to 30% for nonviolent offenders. Sunsets the earned time in four years. Directs the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission to study the impact of increased earned time on public safety. **Savings - \$ 8 million**

Allows a judge to impose no more than 60 days of incarceration in jail upon a defendant who has violated his or her probation. Applies to the local control population, not those on post-prison supervision. **Savings - \$9 million.**
